We Had Two Engaging Luncheon Speakers in April



On April 3, we began the month with Lacy Cotter Vardeman, owner of Cotter Key Farms – just another example of how many different and interesting businesses and activities there are to highlight at our regular Monday Luncheons from the Lubbock and surrounding area.

Lacy said she was "born" to ranching, and "married into" farming, being a 5th generation "ag person" who married a farmer from Holland who is into the cotton movement and sustainability.

Together, they have sold grass-fed angus beef for 15 years to Whole Foods and are starting a new restaurant at 114th & Milwaukee that will "tie people back to agriculture", working closely with local producers.

One interesting comment from Lacy was that "while many folks seem to believe the Ag Industry is heavily subsidized by the government, only 4% of government spending actually goes to agriculture." That's why Lacy is so intent on spreading the word about supporting our local producers.



On April 10, we learned about the West Texas Chapter of the Alzheimer's Association from Heather Simmons, the Consultant Events Manager and Leyna Little, the Manager for the Longest Day Event, a special event held this year on June 21, the longest day of 2023.

Their brochure states, "The Longest Day is the day with the most light- the summer solstice. And it's the day the Alzheimer's Association calls on everyone to fight Alzheimer's disease by raising funds and awareness for care, support, and research" and encourages folks to select such possible activities as golf tournaments, hosting a party, hiking, cooking, playing a game, doing a craft – emphasizing that "any activity can be a fundraiser!"

Heather shared there are more than 1 million Americans dealing with Alzheimer's, and it kills more people every year than breast cancer and prostate cancer combined. The Association has a main goal to destigmatize the disease, so that people will reach out for help, whether it's someone dealing with it personally or someone as a caretaker.

Heather told us that a lot of exciting things are going on with research, especially through the efforts of one of Lubbock's own - Dr. Arubala P. Reddy, PhD. at Texas Tech.

On October 28th, the Association will be holding a Walk to End Alzheimer's at the National Ranching Heritage Center and if you want more information or want to participate in any of their activities, just email them at <u>WestTexas@alz.org</u> or call them at 915-544-1799.

In response to the question "Who is affected by the disease?", the answer was mostly those above 60, but also some with a form of childhood dementia, and many with early onset, so getting educated is the best option and the Association has lots of resources.

One last note, The Association has an around-the-clock Alzheimer's Disease Information and Support Helpline that can be accessed 24/7 at 800-272-3900.

HAND SHAKER PROGRAM

The hand shaker program is designed for you to get to know your fellow AMBUC, and it is also a fundraiser for the Amtryke program. Each member puts a dollar into what is referred to as the "Hand Shaker Pot" when they come into the meeting. At the end of the meeting if your badge number is drawn you are eligible for half of the monies collected for that meeting.

To be eligible to win half of the pot you must do the following:

- Put in your \$1 (that is no option)
- Before you sit down to eat, you are to go around the room and greet each member who is already seated and call them by their first name (i.e.: Hi Richard). If it is a guest, you are to introduce yourself to the individual.
- Each member's badge has a number applied to the back of the badge. At the end of the meeting, usually our speaker is asked to pull out a chip with a number on it.
- If that person is present at the meeting they are eligible for half of the pot, provided they shook or into today's world did an elbow or fist bump with the mystery hand shaker.
- If they did not make contact with the mystery hand shaker, then the money rolls over to the next meeting.
- The "Hand Shaker Program" raises around \$480 during our fiscal year or half of an Amtryke.
- It is the responsibility of the Sargent-at-Arms to pick the mystery hand shaker for the meeting.
