Today's guest speakers were District 5 candidates: Keri Thomas, Randy Christian, (incumbent), and Chase Head. Matt Ernest was the moderator.

ME = Matt Ernest, KT = Kari Thomas, RC = Randy Christian, and CH = Chase Head.

*ME: Introduce yourself and let us know why you should be elected to District 5?*

*KT: " My name is Kari Thomas." She stated she was not a politician and was new to this. She is a wife, a soccer mom, a small business owner here in town, and she was also a servant. She is involved in Trinity Church's youth ministry and helps with the Texas Pregnancy Center...That opened her eyes, especially when it came to our recent voting for Lubbock to be a Sanctuary City for the Life Ordinance. It was this that Kari started to ask questions about the City of Lubbock and what was going on with the City of Lubbock's government. She obtained 5,000 signatures to get Sanctuary City/Life Ordinance on the ballot and assisted in the Life Campaign by door knocking, delivering yard signs, contacting churches, and obtaining a stand at the Flea Market, just to bring awareness that this vote was coming up and the importance of this vote. It was a success as 61% of the voting people*

voted for the Sanctuary City for the unborn. When Covid hit, being a small business owner, it really affected them as they had to shut down. Of course, still having to pay their bills every month. It was a challenge, it was a struggle. They were devastated, but they stood by, and today are still running a good business. But during that time, it opened her eyes as to how much government overreaches, comes in and wipes you out. Another huge issue for her, one she never wants to see again, is the government's over-reaching. She believes the business owners should decide what is best for their businesses. Then the Covid shots came...that was another hard hit for this community. She was a part of group who co-founded the non-profit Health Freedom of Lubbock. They were standing

(KT continuation): for freedom. This is what Americans have had for so long. Again, seeing the government overreaching and telling you, you have to do this in order to have your job, Kari found this to be very scary. She believed it should be your choice. If you want to do the research...and you decide yes you what to take the shot, then that's great. Same goes, if you didn't want the Covid shot. She reinforced it should be your choice. She had success in getting Covid shot medical exemptions.

RC: Councilman Randy Christian reported he would not have ever believed he would have been called Councilman Randy Christian, but he has enjoyed every single minute of being your councilman and representing you in District 5. He stated he was very familiar with our trykes and appreciated everything AMBUCS does. Randy told a few things he has been involved in, both individually and collectively, to accomplish during his last four years. Your 2022 tax rate is now down by 1.56 lower than when he joined the council. Paid down over \$217 million dollars of net debt. \$400 million dollars of LPL debt will be paid by transmission fees. Created a new fire station. Budgeted 52 police vehicles and 3 new fire trucks. \$254 million for LPD and Lubbock Fire and Rescue. La Primo Foods coming to Lubbock and this will affect Lubbock for years to come. The Federal designation of I-27...This will impact Lubbock for years and make Lubbock the Capital of West Texas. It will be our grandchildren and great grandchildren who will get to see the benefits of this. The Lubbock International Airport was redone with Federal dollars. The new water towers are more efficient and will pay for themselves in about 7-8 years. Broke ground on Loop 88. \$9 million dollars to pave dirt roads. Cash was used to pay for many needs instead of borrowing. \$14 million dollars in ARPA funds are being used for public health and public safety and includes a 14-story burn house for fire and rescue. This job is a full time job, no question about it. When Covid hit, it was much for than a full time job, especially for the mayor. Randy stated he was very proud of the way the Health Department handled the Covid and providing vaccinations to the public at the Civic Center...It was like a machine. We are now a 300,000+ city. We are not our grandfather's Lubbock, Texas any more. Change is on the way; growth is on the way, and we need to figure out how to manage it.

CH: Chase thanked the AMBUCS for all the tyrkes and all we do. Chase stated he was born and raised in the Panhandle, went to Texas Tech and was his family's 4<sup>th</sup> generation to attend Texas Tech. His great granddad came to Texas Tech in 1929. Chase moved to Lubbock and fell in love with Lubbock...Never wanted to go anywhere else. He received a Bachelor's in Biology; went back a received his Master's in Business. He is a small business owner who works in real estate and agriculture. Agriculture is the backdrop of the economy of Lubbock where real estate is probably the best predictor of Lubbock. He is married and has two daughters. His wife is a dental hygienist here in Lubbock and has been doing this for about 14-15 years. His daughters go to Frenship ISD and he is a cheer dad. He stated he has been active in multiple organizations in Lubbock: South Plains Food Bank Board member since 2014, assisted with High Point Village and Impact. These are great non-profits organizations in Lubbock. Chaired and been on the Leadership of Lubbock for multiple years...That is one of the best ways to find out about the many facets of Lubbock and understanding what goes on in the city. For several years now, he has been thinking, as well as being encouraged to becoming involved in the city government. He stated he certainly has strong opinions regarding Covid and Sanctuary City. He believed as a city, we are blessed that the vote turned out the way it did on Sanctuary City. Now, Lubbock is a city that has Covid behind us. He stated all of us probably would say in hindsight we would have done things differently during Covid. But he was not going to be critical of the council or the city, because they were making decisions every day and from day to day. This was a first for everybody and no one really knew what to do. Chase stated that this was a calling to his life to do. He believes in his choice to run and is encouraged by some groups who want him to run. He believes, with the right people on the city board, the nuts and bolts of the city, the infra-structure, the services, public safety, are areas in which he can excel as District 5 councilman.

*ME: Last two weeks the property owners have received their appraisals. But that is only the first part of the equation. How much will we pay for property taxes? What is a no tax increase? Is a no increase in the rate itself? Or, is it a no increase in what the average citizen pays?*

KT: A no tax increase is no increase in the rate council sets. Keri's main concern is everybody has had sticker shock from the appraiser's stated value...which went up by 16%. That is double of what it is normally. So, essentially, that means an increase in our tax bills. Her concern is, with everything that

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(KT continuation): is going on with our economy; how is that going to affect the normal tax payer? How will this affect us in day to day businesses? Tax rate should be set to generate the revenue that is needed. She does not believe it should be more than that, unless the voters approve it.

RC: Randy believed it is what the average citizen pays. Of course, the tax rate is set by “us”. But he wanted to get to the bigger question to this: “How do we get appraisals that are correct and where they are not as ridiculous as they are right now?” People are going in and getting their taxes lowered when they contest the appraised amount. So if you have that many people going in and getting a reduction, there is something wrong within this system itself. Last year there was over \$2 million dollars increase in revenue from new properties on the tax rolls. Where does that money go? That money does come in handy at times for us to put it in to good use. He believes in fair and reasonable property taxes...and they should make sense. It will take more than the city council to fix this...it will also take our state legislatures.

CH: Chase believed on paper it's not increasing the tax rate. But, if your property goes up in value, that is an increase in taxes, even though your tax rate remained the same. Your tax bill is derived by your value times your tax rate. So, no matter what your appraisal is, the council can lower your tax rate to a no new tax rate, in order for your taxes to stay the same. He believes there are issues with the appraisal district and there are things needing to be fixed: of which some are county issues. But as far as the city we also can affect the tax rate for the city's portion. Now, there are several us who live in Frenship or Cooper LISD, and those rates are a lot more. So, your schools have a lot to do with your tax rate. Looking at the taxes, coming out of Covid, inflation, gas prices, as a city council member it should be our duty to keep taxes as low as possible and keep the city services where they are now. He believes there should be a no new tax revenue rate.

*ME: The voters rejected the bond act back in November, 2021. Did you support the entire package or did you support just portions of the bond act? Now that the bond was rejected, what is the future for addressing roads and streets in Lubbock?*

RC: That was a fiasco...Let's just be honest about this...He was not particularly crazy about the way the bond act was structured. Some of the people even told the council members that it will fail if you don't give a better description of what Broadway will look like...and it was rejected for the reason the council was already told about. But, Randy stated he wanted to try to make lemonade out of lemons. That's when he started talking to the citizens about bringing back the package without the Broadway portion. He held a town hall, and there was a lot of good input. He thought it would have been even better to have put it on the May election pattern minus the Broadway portion. But what it boiled down to, is they needed to really figure out what needed to be done with Broadway. 114 Street and Quaker is truly a safety hazard and it needs to be done now. There is now a strong possibility we won't see a street bond package addressing this and being voted on until May 2023. Things will really have to come in alignment this year, for us to have a voting package for the November, 2022 ballot.

CH: Chase stated he supported the bond package outside of the Broadway portion. To him this was just another example of where the city did not communicate with the citizens of Lubbock...From the very beginning, the council did a poor job in getting citizens input about what Broadway should look like. Whether that meant asphalt all the way, asphalt with brick pavers, or whether it was redoing bricks all the way. He believes the citizens are the ones who should have made that decision and how it was to look. For the other roads, we do have roads, (i.e. 98<sup>th</sup> Street west of Upland) that are just dirt roads. Around that particular dirt road there are hundreds, if not thousands of houses, resulting in a major safety concern. Travelling on it at 7:30 in the morning, you can't see because of the dirt coming up from the road. It is just dangerous. It is embarrassing to have that type of development and have that type of road in Lubbock. Another concern about the road package is, it would have just “caught us up” on what was needed; it certainly was not going to get us ahead of the curve. We would still have safety issues on west 34<sup>th</sup> and west 50<sup>th</sup> streets, and south of 114 and Frankford which are areas where Frenship and Cooper grows... and these roadways have their safety concerns. We have to address future growths and safety.

KT: Kari does believe the infra-structure of our roads is a very critical issue. The voters rejected the \$175 million dollar street bond with every single precinct voting against it. So, if she represented District 5,  
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(KT continuation): she would have to ask “Why did every single precinct in District 5 vote against it? She believes there was not enough trust in such a large package to be presented to the voters. There was not a great deal of information giving to the voters. She believes prioritizing spending is important, and there is a need for a comprehensive plan to address our infra-structure. These will be her top priorities.

*ME: Do you support plans for a city park?*

KT: That is a great question. Kari believes in District 5, you need to prioritize safety and infra-structure, before prioritizing the down town city park. She does think a down town city park is a great idea. Her question is: “What will that look like as far as security?” We do have a homeless population in Lubbock, There are several great organizations who work with our homeless population. She believes that needs to be under control. Again, she reinforced the need to prioritize District 5’s safety, roads (i.e. 114), and putting down asphalt on dirt roads. She stated she appreciated down town and there needs to be a seat at the table for down town, but she would have to prioritize District 5 first.

RC: From the beginning he believed there was a misconception about the down town city park going to be funded 100% by the city. He did not want it to be funded by the city. The people who are working on down town re-development are working on obtaining private funds for the down town city park. Randy stated he was a big fan of having it privately funded or public/private partnerships. However, having a city park down town is very important, because it is what the millennials want. So many young people and people from Texas Tech want to live down town. They want a park and the down town park would be a big part of enhancing down town. Many people on the council went down to Midland to look at a park they have...it actually served as a model. In Midland, you can actually rent out the whole park for private events. So this could bring in revenue to the city...Don’t know if it could be a big enough revenue generator to pay for all the maintenance...that remains to be seen. He believes you do have to look at public/private partnerships. One thing he bragged on, and will be opening soon, is the dog park in McAllister Park. He used his marketing skills and personal relationships to obtain a person who give a \$2 million dollar gift to the Parks and Recreation with the earmark for the dog park. So 80% of the dog park was paid with the \$2 million dollar gift.

CH: Chase believes even though he would represent District 5, he believed you could not forget the down town city park and the importance it would have in the down town area. We would like to keep the talent that comes from Texas Tech here in Lubbock. It will be by having a down town that is robust, growing, and being a vital part to our community, that will have students wanting to stay. With that said, he then followed up and stated he did not want to see tax payers’ money going to a park in the down town area. The down town area needs to have a plan up-front on how we are going handle the homeless situation. He stated he had seen some of the water features of the park, but was concerned with “How is the city going to prevent the homeless from using the water features for a shower or bathtub?” So there are definitely certain things needing to be considered first. Yes, Chase stated he would like to see a park, but there are a lot of things that need to be planned out before one is built in the down town area.

*ME: There was an increase in crimes, especially in homicides, in 2020 and 2021. The police state here in Lubbock, the odds are in favor that in these situations, the victim and the attacker know one another. It’s not just a random crime. With that said, what can be done to reduce crime in Lubbock?*

CH: This is his top priority. Sure a lot of those people know one another, but he has also seen drive by shootings, children shot; so whether they know one another or not, we have to get a handle on this. We have a major problem with this and the violent crime involving homicides are in certain areas of Lubbock. Car break-ins have increased to an unbelievable rate in Southwest Lubbock. A huge factor in the car break-ins is...the people who are looking for guns. We need to educate the gun owners to be responsible and not store their gun(s) in the car. By being a city councilman, he would be to supportive of our officers and listen to their ideas. The police officers have many great ideas. Right now, he doesn’t believe they have the support in their comments to reduce crime. So this would be his top priority to support the officers. He also stated he has receive endorsement from the Lubbock Police Association.

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**RC:** It starts with his idea that “this is not our grandfather’s Lubbock” anymore. It is a growth situation ...as our city grows, we are going to have good people and bad people move into our community. About two months ago, he stated he sat down with 3 members of the Lubbock anti-gang task force. He had met with them four years ago before he became a councilman. But the dynamics of these gangs has changed radically just during those four years. Now, it is “hyper-gangs”. They now have “I don’t care” type of attitude. That’s the reason you see a 14 year old, popping someone at the mall...It is that kid that fits that profile. We will never have enough cops on the street, like we would like to have, to stop crime. This is a community effort. How many of you remember the old “crime line” where if you knew something about a crime you could call in a tip. If your tip panned out and it resulted in an arrest, you would get a reward. Where has this gone? Let’s bring this back. He believes we do need to do a better job of supporting our neighborhood watch programs and start new neighborhood watch programs. He stated he loves our cops. When he was a new councilman, he went on a ride-along on one Halloween with a young gentleman, probably Chase’s age. The technology in their car is incredible. He believes we need to develop a program “Adopt-a-cop” or “Care for a cop”. It is where you just send a thank you note or tell them how much you appreciate them.

**KT:** First of all, Kari states she does support the police and she believes they do need to hear more often...we support them, we are behind them...we want them to be successful in our community and in our state. One of her main concerns is utilizing the three police substations to their maximum potential. The whole part of having these substations was to be a part of the community. To let the community know the police were there to support and help you. There needs to be a bridge between the community and those three substations. Secondly, we have to figure out what is going on with police recruitment and retention...Currently, they are understaffed. Recently, the police just got a raise. We have to ask the questions: “ What is going on? Why are we not able to get recruitments? Why are we not able to retain these police officers?” So the city council needs to ask these hard questions and get answers in order for our city to be able to move forward in keeping our city safe.

**ME:** *You now have 60 seconds for your pitch why people need to vote for you?*

**CH:** Fourteen days from today, you are voting. You should vote for CH because he believes you need a new and younger generation in city leadership. One that through his children and their children are looking for Lubbock as a place they can call home for them and their kids (CH’s grandkids). CH has been involved in this community for a long time, not just recently to become involve in and wanting to to run for city council. He stated he loved and supported this for many years. He has a background in agriculture, real estate, he is a small business owner. He has felt the pain of small business owners coming out of Covid. He understands looking at a P&L budget...he knows if there is a \$1.8 million dollar debt, there is a major issue. He believes in getting a handle on that debt and paying it down. He believes there are major opportunities in making changes to the city budget. Thank you.

**RC:** He stated he was the old guy with four years of experience. That is probably one of the top reasons he wants to serve 4 more years. He isn’t a career politician; he is just somebody who wants the opportunity to serve our city, and to serve it well by taking on the new challenges; because of our issues, because of our growth, because of infra-structure, and because of the many things facing us. We will always be playing catch-up for a long time. He likes to think he brings in a perspective that he brought to the table when he was in his ad agency where he worked with small, medium and large mom and pop businesses to the larger Wells Fargo, Covenant, and other businesses here in Lubbock. He knows that we want to keep our values as Lubbock grows. To maintain those values will be struggle. So basically, he has four years of experience and he has learned so much by being our councilman. It is a tough job; it was tougher due to Covid. He would not wish that on anyone or for that fact wish Sanctuary City on anyone as it was divisive. It is important to him for people to come together, forget the past and look towards the future. To work together for our children and grand-children. Thank you.

KT: Keri said she had stated earlier she was a wife, a soccer mom, she is a small business owner and she isn't a politician. ## HAND SHAKER PROGRAM

The hand shaker program is designed for you to get to know your fellow AMBUC, and it is also a fundraiser for the Amtryke program. Each member puts a dollar into what is referred to as the “Hand Shaker Pot” when they come into the meeting. At the end of the meeting if your badge number is drawn you are eligible for half of the monies collected for that meeting.

To be eligible to win half of the pot you must do the following:

- Put in your \$1 (that is no option)
- Before you sit down to eat, you are to go around the room and greet each member who is already seated and call them by their first name (i.e.: Hi Richard). If it is a guest, you are to introduce yourself to the individual.
- Each member’s badge has a number applied to the back of the badge. At the end of the meeting, usually our speaker is asked to pull out a chip with a number on it.
- If that person is present at the meeting they are eligible for half of the pot, **provided they shook or into today’s world - did an elbow or fist bump with the mystery hand shaker.**
- If they did not make contact with the mystery hand shaker, then the money rolls over to the next meeting.
- The “Hand Shaker Program” raises around \$480 during our fiscal year or half of an Amtryke.
- It is the responsibility of the Sargent-at-Arms to pick the mystery hand shaker for the meeting.
